EASTER WEEKEND BRUNCH

Over the Easter holiday, there will be brunch routine on Friday the 13th, Saturday the 14th, Sunday the 15th, and Monday the 16th. Times will remain the same at 1000 hours.

HOBBY SHOP REMINDER

Inmates who require the occasional use of power tools for their hobbies must contact the S.C.D.O. for a work order. This work order and wood project is taken to works department who will make the required cuts.

Inmates who send out finished hobbies or have hobby material brought in, must obtain a gate pass from S.C.D.O. All hobbies must be completed with materials purchased by the inmate.



Inmates are not permitted to buy, barter or sell finished or unfinished hobbies or

material from other inmates. If a substantial amount of scrap wood is used, a "note" from the works office must be obtained verifying that fact otherwise that item could be classified as contraband.

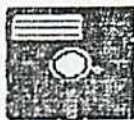
