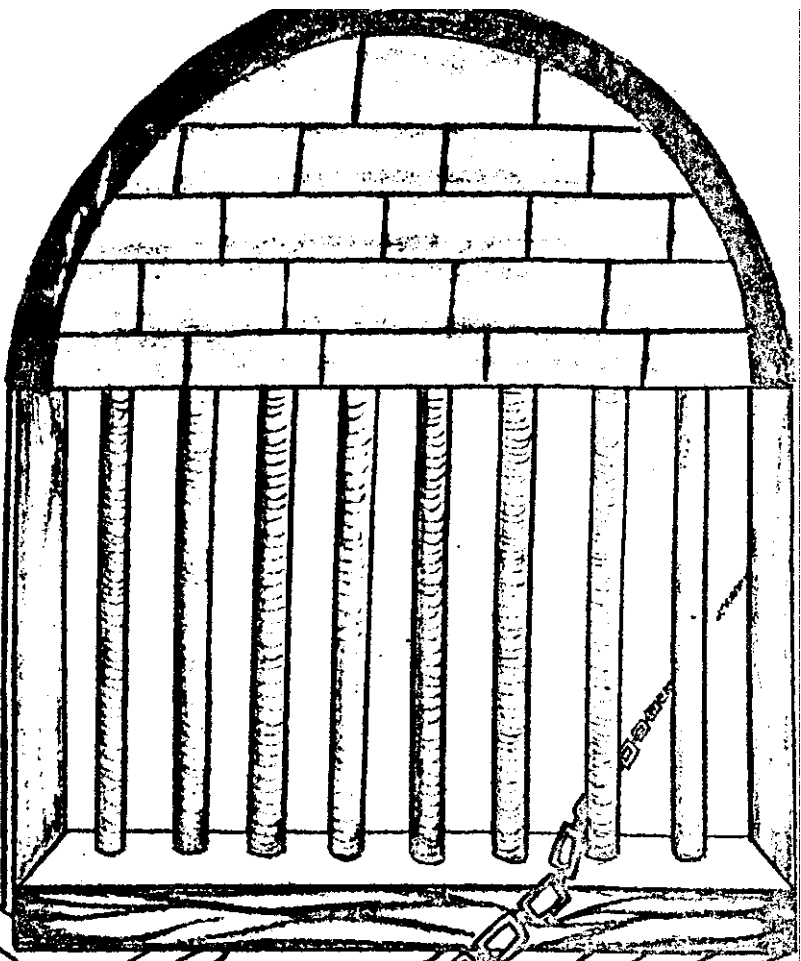
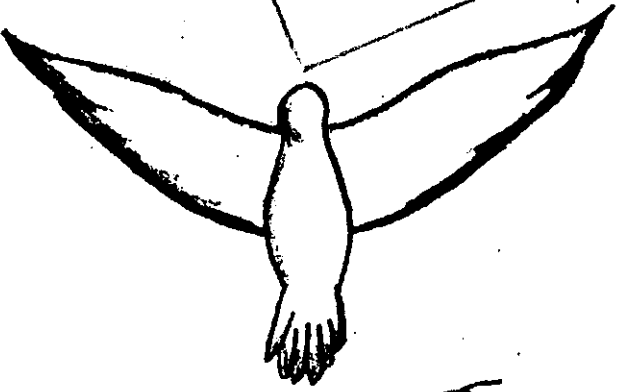

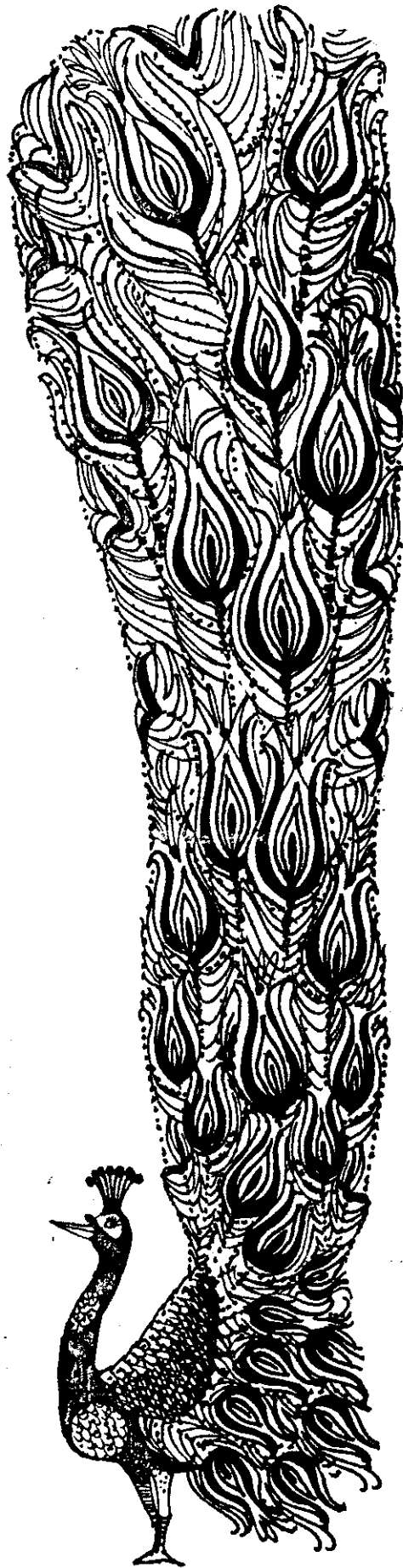
Carole and Peter Snell of Major Roadworks Theatre were well pleased that all their efforts and time reflected a successful production.

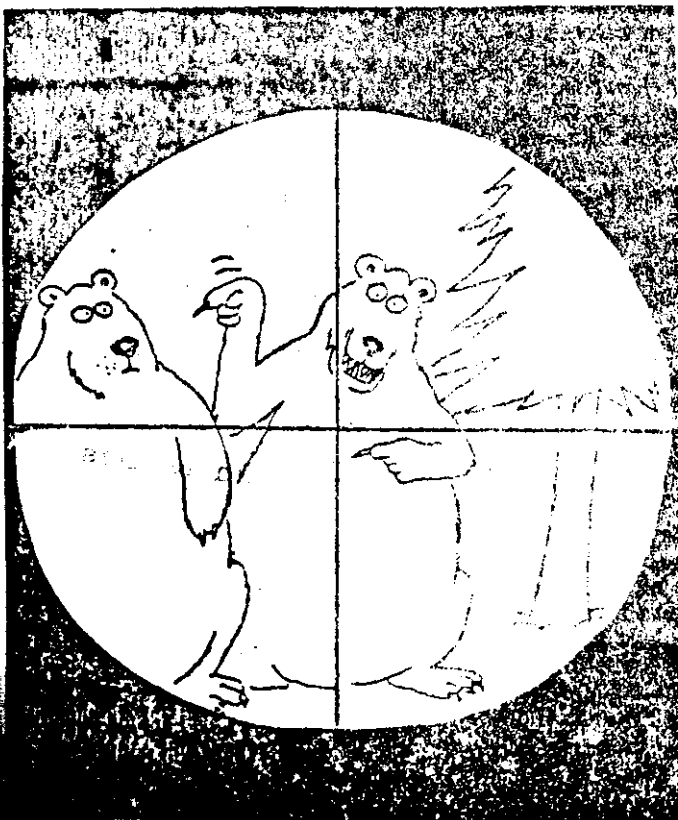
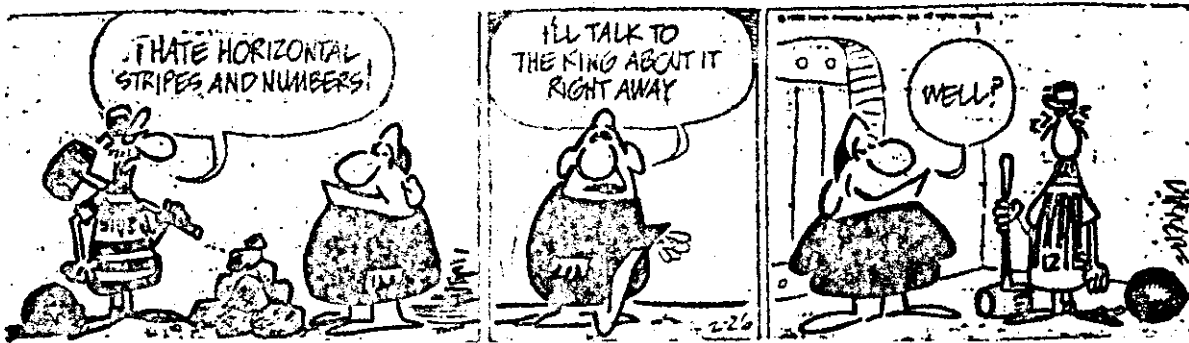
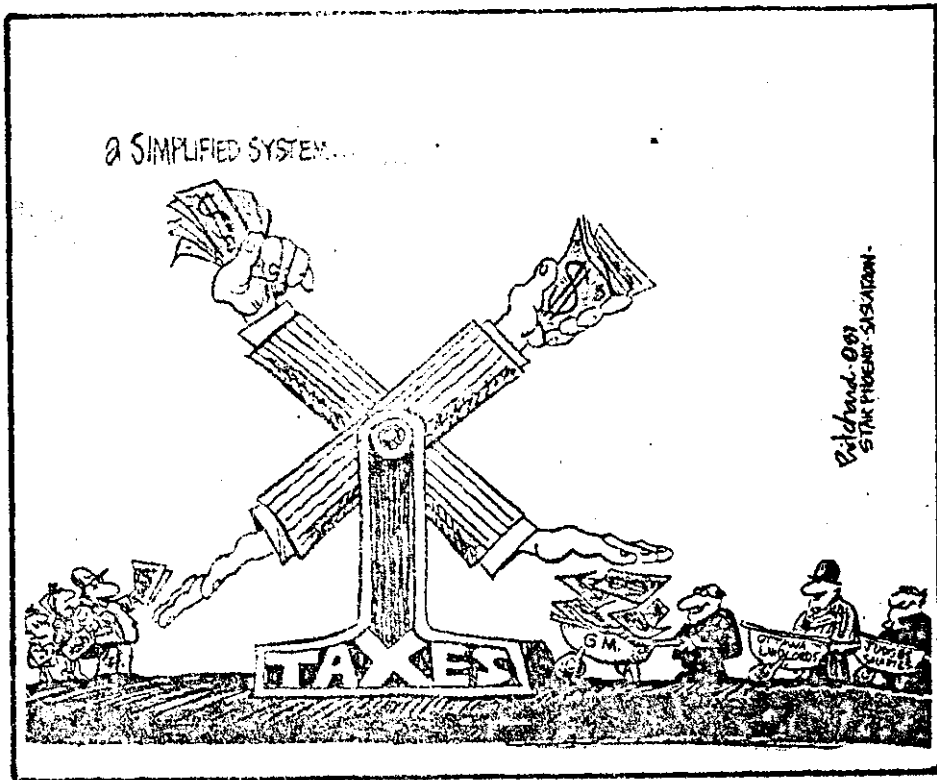
He does not lead me year by year;

LIFE! (WITH HOPE)

Senator Earl A. Hastings held a seminar with those persons serving a life term sentence in an attempt to seek some sort of consensus towards the needs and realities of these individuals. The meeting took place at the chapel Tuesday, July 26th.

The following is the gist of what was discussed in brief, point fashion form.

..... The senator felt that the new Commissioner of Penitentiaries, (formerly the chairman of the National Parole Board) Mr. Ole Ingstrup, offered a new found sense of hope for those doin' a life bit.

..... The Daubeney Commission is withholding it's report until sometime after the upcoming Federal Election.

..... That there were approximetly 60 persons doin' a life sentence @ Warkworth.

..... The senator felt that inmates must become better prepared for their judicial reviews which would take place at 15 years on a 25 year bit. In this regard, several fellows expressed a desire towards increased access to psychological and psychiatric services and some sort of consistency or stability of programs throughout a "Life-server's" sentence. In addition, there was an expressed need for an increase in post secondary education funding.

..... Some of those in attendance requested an opportunity of furthering family ties and bonds with increased access to trailer and family visits.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

LENGTH OF SENTENCES—RESEARCH FINDINGS

Mr. Jim Jepson (London East): Mr. Speaker, now that the capital punishment debate is over, the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs, of which I am a member, has crossed the country, from Vancouver to Halifax, hearing witnesses on the most important matter of parole and sentencing. Clearly, most Canadians have expressed concern that those who have committed violent and sexual crimes are not receiving sentences that are commensurate with the crime committed, and violent criminals are being released too early on parole.

I asked the very excellent research staff of our Justice Committee to research the length of sentences for attempted murder, manslaughter, and criminal negligence causing death. I would like to share a bit of this information now.

Offenders released each year for conviction of attempted murder and manslaughter have served an average of three to four years. Those convicted of criminal negligence causing death served an average of one year to 1.3 years in penitentiary. Those convicted of rape and aggravated sexual assault served an average of two years to 3.5 years. Although each sentence has its own mitigating circumstances, this over-all record speaks for itself and is totally unacceptable.

Although the information available on parole and sentencing was limited, I still believe it confirms what myself and most Canadians believe.

Echoes of the Past, Visions for the Present

WHAT THE HELL IS FREE ABOUT FREE TRADE?

In 1968, Prime Minister Trudeau wrapped himself up in a Canadian flag and signed a first mortgage with the American-Money-Lenders against our childrens future to the tune of 30 billion dollars.

The Americans said it was free; Trudeau said it was free; And somehow we felt freer for it. Only a Canadian would settle for a policy of keeping our wheat selling at below production costs and our Great Lakes of polluted waters in return for selling off the rest of the country!

Only a Canadian would sell out our heritage, our grandchildren's heritage for a simple agreement of bread and water!

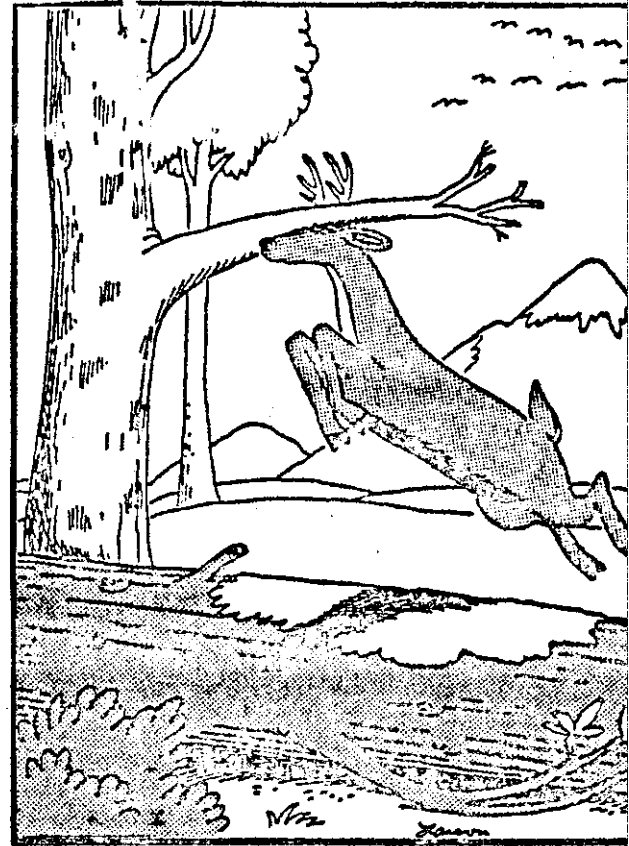
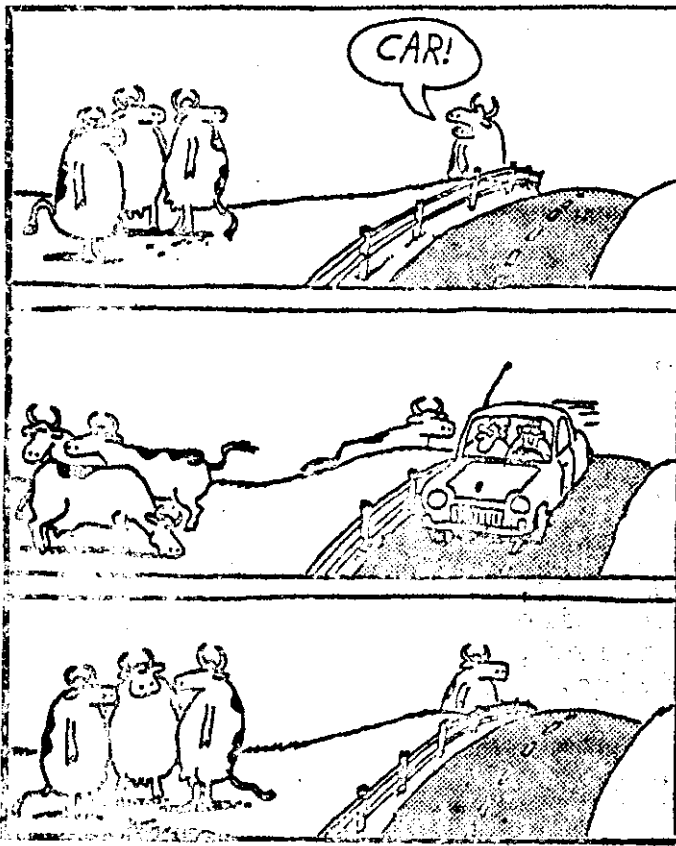
HERITAGE FROM THE PAST

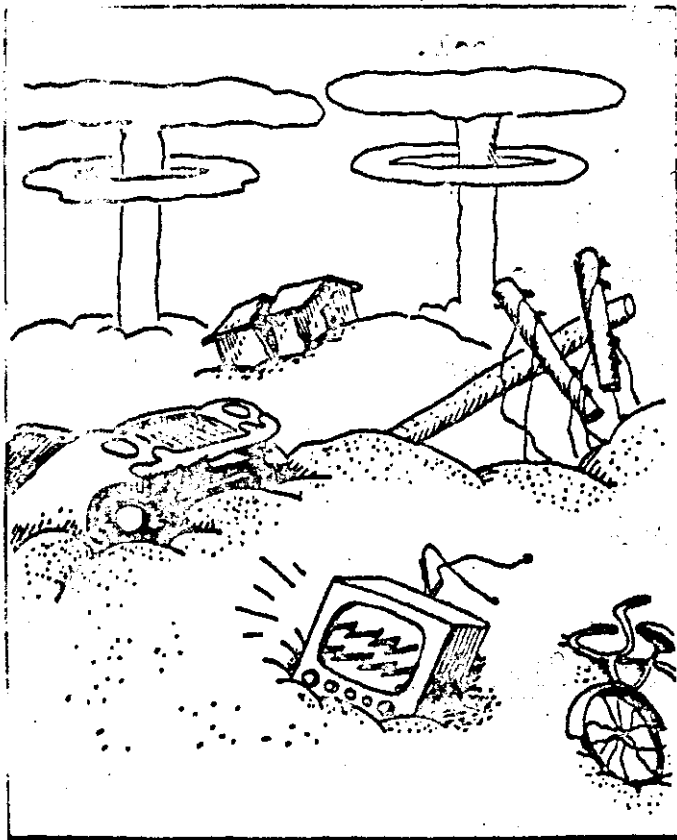

Something to think about for Canadians, Mr. Speaker.

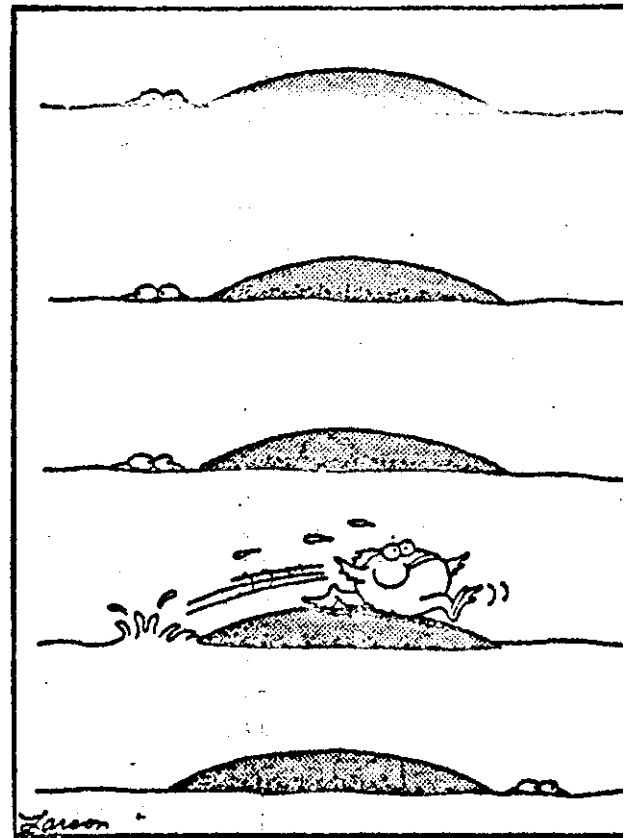

WELCOME TO HOBBYCRAFT !!

HOW, AS A NEWCOMER, DO I GET A HOBBYCRAFT PERMIT?

1. Decide which hobby is of interest to you and that you are capable of doing to a certain degree of satisfaction;
2. Discuss this matter with the Instructor to confirm your choice and learn more of the hobby as it is done here at Warkworth;
3. Obtain a "Request Form" and fill in your intentions to start this particular hobby activity;
4. Then have the Request Form authorized by both your L.U. #1 and the L.U. #2 of your block;
5. Bring this completed form with you when you come to Hobbycraft to make your initial order for start-up materials;
6. Funds to cover this order are taken from your "Current Account" by the Finance department on a bi-weekly basis (remember your canteen is drawn from your pay before any orders are processed);
7. When your order arrives, the materials will be issued at the hobbycraft office and it is at this point that a permit will be issued;
8. Display your permit on your bulletin board at all times!

WHAT IF I TRANSFER HERE AND ALREADY HAVE A HOBBY?

1. When you arrive, A&D will separate your hobbycraft from your personal effects, keeping them there;
2. If and when you wish to receive your hobbycraft effects, it is necessary to complete a "Request Form" stating this desire;
3. Have this request form signed by the L.U. #1 in the block;
4. Bring the completed form to hobbycraft and hand in;
5. Your effects will be retrieved from A&D within 7 days and you will be called to the hobbycraft shop for issuing of same;
6. A "Permit" will be issued at the same time your effects are issued;
7. Display your permit on your bulletin board at all times!

WHAT IF I WANT A PERMIT AND AM NOT A NEWCOMER?

1. Even if you are not a newcomer, you must still follow the same procedures given for newcomers;
2. No permits will be issued unless this procedure is followed and materials are ordered;
3. To change from one activity to another also requires following this procedure.

HOBBYCRAFT LOANS:

Hobbycraft loans are available to the majority on a one-time basis. Funds are loaned from the Welfare Funds and are repaid by regular deductions from your pay. Applications and further information is available in the hobbycraft shop.

SERVICES AVAILABLE

ACCESS TO FILES: If you are interested in obtaining your files or have letters done in reference to exemptions.

SOCIAL INSURANCE CARDS: We will help you complete forms to apply for these.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES: These are necessary to obtain a Social Insurance card and are a good form of identification.

HALFWAY HOUSES: If you want information about halfway houses, books are available for you to review. (To qualify for a day parole, you must have acceptance at a halfway house.)

PAROLE PAPERS: We will type up your parole papers and help you to formulate a plan to meet your individual needs for presentation to your L.U.

TRANSFER FORMS: We will assist you in completing and typing same.

PASS PAPERS: Assistance in preparation for presentation to L.U.

O.S.A.P.: Assistance in form completion and application for bursary.

LETTERS OF IMPORTANCE: Assistance in drafting and typing same.

POSTAL CODES: All code books for the country situated at C.I.S.

COLLEGE COURSES: Perhaps to assist with your parole plans, we have most college calendars available.

VISITING: Maps of the area are available to forward out to your visitors.

TRAILER VISITS: Regulations and information available to ascertain your qualifications.

WEEKLY NEWSLETTER: Issued and posted each week on block bulletin boards.

OUTLOOK MAGAZINE: PUBLISHED EVERY TWO MONTHS AND ALL CONTRIBUTIONS ARE WELCOME. WE ENCOURAGE YOUR PARTICIPATION AND SUBMISSIONS.

GENERAL INFORMATION: We make every attempt to assist you with any information requested.

CLAIM AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT: Forms are available for you to obtain concerning compensation for loss of personal belongings, etc.

A LETTER FROM THE SCHOOL -----

August 9, 1988.

NOTIFICATION TO ALL CORRESPONDENCE STUDENTS - Secondary Level

There seems to be some confusion as to how to obtain more than one Independent Learning Centre (ILC) course. Some have been refused a second or subsequent course, this being due to a policy that I.L.C. has implemented to address the problem of students ordering courses and then not completing them.

The policy clearly states that a minimum of 5 lessons on any course must be COMPLETED and RETURNED to the student before a subsequent course can be ordered. If you meet this criteria then it is allowed for another course to be ordered but only ONE AT A TIME.

The student may carry as many courses as he wishes providing he meets the requirements/prerequisites demanded by the course description. The student must have achieved a minimum of Grade 8 education to order a Grade 9 course, Grade 9 level for a Grade 10 course and so on. This policy is wholly operated by the school here at Warkworth #17 building school. Proof of the minimum education requirements must be provided by a transcript of Secondary School marks or the institutional S.C.A.T. test. If such proof is provided, application may be made for a secondary course at the 17 building school office. All applications are subject to the scrutiny of J.L. Landry (Head Teacher) and must be signed by him for any I.L.C. course to be obtained. If an application to I.L.C. is made without Mr. Landry's signature the application will be refused.

Any other questions you may have concerning secondary courses can be answered at the 17 building school office.
